#### **Welcome: Chief Safety Officer Keith Squires KEYNOTE: Why Do People Engage in Harmful Behaviors?**

Presenter: Dr. Chris Linder, Professor of Higher Education and founder and Director of the McCluskey Center for Violence Prevention at the University of Utah

Have you ever wondered why people continue to engage in harmful behaviors, despite knowing that there are consequences for their behaviors? Have you interacted with people who have broken the law or harmed another human and been puzzled about why this person may have engaged in such behavior because they showed up like a "regular" person? In this session, Dr. Linder will examine some reasons why people might engage in low-level harmful behaviors, providing an opportunity for us to collectively consider strategies for intervening with such behavior to prevent more escalated behavior later. Dr. Linder's research primarily focuses on college students who engage in harmful dating and sexual relationships, and the work has implications beyond higher education.

#### The Future of Policing

Presenter: Monica Alnes Niklaus, Director of Projects, Major Cities Chiefs Association

What is the future of policing? It's a complex and uncertain idea that depends on multiple factors, such as technology, crime, society, and politics. In this presentation, we will explore how the Major Cities Chiefs Association is monitoring current and emerging technologies, threats, and social phenomena - to help anticipate what police officers around the country might be facing tomorrow, next year or a decade from now. The convergence of law enforcement with AI, robotics, UAVs, biological and chemical trends, and other topics will be discussed in this jam-packed hour. Attendees will walk away thinking about not only the challenges but the opportunities that lay ahead for police, and understand that the time is now, to be prepared for the future.

#### **Unbroken: Turning Adversity into Strength**

Presenter: Command Sergeant Major Gretchen Evans

Command Sergeant Major (RET) Gretchen Evans a highly decorated soldier, Purple Heart, Bronze Star, Combat Action Badge, President Citation Awards, and multiple other awards, served 27 years in the United States Army. While serving in Afghanistan she came under a rocket attack and was severely wounded, resulting in total hearing loss, a traumatic brain injury and multiple other injuries. Her career abruptly ended and like many other Veterans, she faced a long battle of rehabilitation from her injuries, transitioning in civilian life and finding her new passion and purpose.

With the help of her hearing service dog, doctors and her rope team, Gretchen found that healing was more than just about getting better. She authored "Leading from the Front," founded Team UNBROKEN, an adaptive athletic team who competes in arduous races all over the world to include the World's Toughest Race currently airing on Amazon Prime and speaks worldwide about grit, gumption, resilience and hope.

Gretchen shares her story with an authentic voice, humor and life lessons that will resonate with all people.

# How to Enhance and Preserve Information Gain from Interviews with Witnesses and Suspects

Presenter: Dr. Kara Moore, Assistant Professor, University of Utah Department of Psychology

An important goal of interacting with witnesses and suspects is to gain information to solve a case. There are multiple psychological issues at play when gathering information from people including how well they remember the criminal event and how willing they are to share information about the criminal event. This presentation will cover what psychological research can tell us about how to preserve and enhance memory accuracy and how to detect deception in interviews with witnesses and suspects.

#### K-12 to Higher Education: Creating Consistent Messaging & Security Principles

Presenter: Chief Matt Pennington, Utah State Security Chief, Utah Department of Public Safety

Like other higher education institutions in Utah, most incoming undergraduate students at the University of Utah are Utah residents and come from the state's K-12 school systems. This presentation explores how K-12 security principles can help guide higher education practices by understanding the importance of consistent messaging and training of staff and students as they transition from K-12 to higher education. This presentation will highlight how integrating CPTED, threat management, and Standard Response Protocol is beneficial in addressing the hazards in both educational settings. Attendees will gain actionable insights into creating safer education spaces through adopting K-12 security principles at higher education institutions.
